Notes on Our June Speaker: Barry Shainbaum

At the June meeting we saw another aspect of photography - a healing tool to help overcome challenges and in the process produce an inspiring book. Barry Shainbaum, our speaker for the evening, has many talents. He is a gifted photographer, a radio host, a professional speaker, a musician and a community volunteer!

Barry grew up in Hamilton, Ontario with his parents and his sister where he was an excellent student. At the age of eighteen, disaster struck. While waiting for a bus, mental illness carried him away. Fortunately, Barry was able to use his love of photography as a connection to his soul and to analyze his life. Since then, photography has been a teaching, learning, and creative tool.

One of the first pictures Barry showed tonight was a 1979 monochrome shot of a young boy swinging out over the water. At the time, he was teaching photography at a summer camp. Barry has always had persistence and tenacity - these traits have helped him throughout his life. He has used photography to vicariously live through others. When he could not understand or connect with what was going on in his life, he used photographs to explain things. For example, he took a picture of a young boy jumping to express the hidden joy he could not speak of at the time.

He has always liked photographing famous people. He succeeded by taking chances, challenging himself. While he was a student at Ryerson, he got up his courage and asked the famous Sam Sniderman (AKA Sam The Record Man). He went to the iconic store on Yonge Street and to his delight Sam agreed to being snapped by the young photographer.

Walking down Bond St. near Ryerson Photo Arts one day, Barry saw a woman waiting for a ride. To his surprise, two ducks started quacking as they peeped out of her shopping bag. On chatting with the woman, it turned out she worked for the Catholic Family Services and a client had given her the ducks in payment. She agreed to getting her picture taken with the birds. Snap! Barry was off to the offices of the Toronto Sun. His photograph of the woman and her ducks was published in the next edition. Barry was given credit in the Sun and forty dollars for his efforts!

He learned a lot from Barry Philp, his photojournalism professor at Ryerson. For instance, one day Mr. Philp gave the class an assignment to go to someplace where no one knows you and photograph. Driving around southern Ontario, Barry ended up at the small town of Dundalk, above Shelburne on highway 10, and eventually boarded with a retired farming couple for two weeks. Taking pictures (often humorous) of the various people in town including Lloyd, the butcher, made the visit one of the best times in his life. He augmented his photos with the stories and backgrounds of his subjects. After he finished the assignment, he returned to Dundalk and showed the photographs to the townsfolk. Over the years he has returned to the little town time and again. Today, many businesses he recorded have disappeared and many of the people he photographed have passed. Nevertheless, he still has fond memories of the community and its people.

Another assignment he had was to photograph one family for a year. Walking down Brunswick Avenue one day in search of a suitable subject, he spotted a house with a kite flying from a light in the living room. Knocking on the door, the owners invited him in. It turned out that the father and mother were primal (scream) therapists! He spent the year recording the family (including the kids and cat) every three or four weeks.

Graduating from Ryerson, the newly minted photographer worked for North York's board of education at Bayview Junior High (now called Bayview Middle School). One assignment from the school was to take a group photograph of it's staff and

students. Assembling his subjects in the school yard, he scrambled up on the roof. He didn't direct them to assemble in any particular order, and on its own, the group formed in the shape of a maple leaf, complete with a stem! "It is amazing how life gives you those opportunities," he commented to us.

About 20 years ago, Barry wanted to meet some of the female personalities seen on local TV. His strategy was simple - call the TV station and ask for the person. When connected, he explained he was "working on his portfolio" and would like to photograph them. The first person he photographed was CBC's Valerie Pringle. She surprised Barry by agreeing to the shoot, suggesting a nearby park. She joined him there with her dog, Barry captured dog and celebrity together. He went on to call others including Theresa Roncon from CITY TV. In Theresa's case, she accepted the offer and was photographed at her home.

Working as a freelance photographer for Macleans Magazine, Barry went to northern British Columbia. While doing the shoot, serendipity once again stepped in. Another client at that time was the Toronto based Canadian Jewish News (CJN). Barry called to see if they had any subscribers in northern BC. "Just one guy," they replied. Barry called him. "No, I'm not Jewish," the subscriber

replied. The man said he did have a connection to Judaism - an aunt from long ago was Jewish, and he subscribed to the CJN out of curiosity. Barry went to his house and took a picture of him and his pet wolf. Back home, he pitched the story and pictures. CJN published both.

Barry's biggest accomplishment so far is his book "Hope and Heroes." The cover of the first printing features his portrait of Martin Sheen of West Wing fame. The book portrays fortyseven people. The idea for the book came when he contacted Charles Templeton in 1992. At the time, Templeton was an evangelist. Templeton later became an agnostic, and went on to become a popular author and broadcaster. Barry photographed the famous writer and six years later he asked Templeton to introduce him to Billy Graham for a portrait, When asked why, Barry said off handedly, the portrait would be part of a book on people of integrity and how they have impacted positively on the world. Afterwards, he thought, "what a great idea for a book"!

He believed in the book and began to make connections by cold calling people. He placed a small ad in business personals for a publicist to sell the idea. One by one, he slowly accumulated portraits and the stories behind them. He firmly believes, "If you have a dream, pursue it. With will and perseverance, it will come true!"

One of the people he photographed for the book was Martin Sheen. Sheen was both a well known actor and a social activist. During the flight to Los Angeles, Barry decided to shoot Martin Sheen in handcuffs – because of the number of times Sheen had been arrested as a protester. Naively, he called the West Hollywood police, and asked to borrow a pair, offering a credit in the book. He was promptly turned down, but the police officer referred him to a local adult store where he bought a pair to the delight of Sheen.

As our evening progressed, Barry showed other pictures he had in the book, along with out-takes. The members enjoyed his stories of how the pictures were taken and why a particular one was chosen for the book. He emphasized that it was important to listen to the subject. "Getting a person's whole story gives ideas on how they should be photographed," he said.

Of the forty-seven people in the book, he was able to personally inter-

view all but two - Nelson Mandela, and Billy Graham, while he did photograph both of them, and had a chance to say hello to Mandela. The book took three and a quarter years from inception to publication.

His next book is called "Dancing In The Rain." The book is sponsored by The Mood Disorders Association of Ontario. He has photographed twenty-five people for the book. Each participant, including Barry himself, tells his story about struggling with mental illness and the journey through it. He showed some pictures from the book, once more telling stories about the pictures and giving background information.

He also showed some other pictures from his portfolio such as graffiti in the back alleys of Toronto, houses in St. John's Newfoundland, etc. ending the presentation with a picture in Strawberry Fields (New York City) at the grave of John Lennon. Barry's rapport with the members was comfortable and up-lifting. He likes to keep his shooting style simple, preferring available light. If he does need added light, it is usually a single strobe and occasionally a second light source for the background. He goes more for subject matter that works for him. It was an





Vishniac, who was born in Russia in 1897, was commissioned by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee to document Eastern European Jewish life between 1935 and 1938. Previously, only three hundred and fifty of his photographs were available; the new digital archive includes almost ten thousand of Vishniac's negatives. It is, according to the I.C.P.,

"the most extensive photographic record, by any single photographer, of Jewish life in Central and Eastern Europe before the Holocaust."

Kodak negotiates with studios to continue movie stock production

According to the Wall Street Journal, a group of studios have been negotiating with Kodak to stave off the threatened end of production of movie film stock in Rochester. The journal reports that motion picture film sales have plummeted from a high of 12.4 billion linear feet in 2006 to a projected 449 million this year. The agreements would commit the studios to puchase a certain amount of film over the next few years. Fujifilm stopped production of motion picture film in 2013. The article also points out that film is the only long-term preservation medium for movies, unlike digital files need to be constantly rerecorded and transferred to new formats.

A book report....

Angelika (Angie) Littlefield wants our readers to know about Ilse Salberg, a Weimar photographer who struggled during the darkest Nazi times. Angie has e-published an article available at http://www.angielittlefield.com/ebooks/llseSalbergWeimarPhotographer.pdf

Toronto author Angie was researching the biography of her great aunt Angelika Hoerle who died in 1923; there was an Ilse Salberg involved in that story. Out of the blue, she got a call from Amy Shatten in Atlanta, Georgia, the grand-daughter of that Ilse Salberg. Intrigued, Angie flew down Atlanta, there to discover a treasure trove of photographica – the residue of Ilse Salberg's life. For the next five years Angie painstakingly pieced togeher the puzzle of Ilse's life – sometimes only a few words, sometimes great chapters.

Ilse Salberg's life began in 1901 in Goerlitz, a Prussian town. She was the daughter of a prosperous Jewish merchant. The family moved to Cologne, where in the 1920s, Ilse developed an interest in photography and studied with photographic master August Sander, who had a studio there. Ilse became the lover of artist/photographer Anton Raederscheid and affected a "bohemian" lifestyle.

In 1935 Ilse was experimenting with a Leica IIIA when she and Anton wandered into a restricted zone. Detained as spies, Ilse and Anton resolved they needed to leave Germany—with or without papers. Anton, Ilse and daughter Brigitte escaped to Britain and then went on to Paris. One could say that Ilse's photographic art first transcended mere craft in the Paris studio she and Anton shared in arts hot-spot Villa Brune. Clearly Ilse was influenced by the leading photographic artists of the day--Léger and Picasso, both with their political commitment as well as their art. She began experimenting with hélio gravure, an intaglio print process, for which she had purchased a hand-turned press during her artistic foray to Sanary. She set about mastering the photochemical procedures and ultimately achieved success in the photographic press.








With the rumblings of war, Ilse was interned at Gurs, 34 km north of the Spanish border. Ilse sold her jewellery to help her family in Sanary survive. When gendarmes came to their front door September 7, 1942, all the residents of the house escaped out the back door and took refuge in a butcher shop. Crawling out from beneath the meat which had hidden them, they walked to Switzerland.

In 1945 Ilse lost her second breast to cancer and her son to the Nazis. She lingered on, critically ill, until March 28, 1947. Her photographic talent fell into obscurity. Her surviving works only surfaced through the efforts of Anton's son Pascal. Ilse's rescued works speak volubly for her in the book, *Grenzgaenger: Flucht und Neubeginn* 1936–1947. /RL






