

February visit to the Market Gallery

The February meeting was held at the Market Gallery in Toronto where attendees were able to leisurely view a striking exhibit of photographs by three Toronto Photographers. One of the photographers, 97 year old Harry Joy, is the father-in-law of our membership secretary Wayne Gilbert, a photographer himself. opened the evening by providing a brief introduction as follows.

The exhibition at the Market Gallery is well named "Toronto Through Observed Three Generations" as it shows the very different perspectives of three photographers, Harry Joy, Doug Hemmy and Andy Brooks, in how they saw - and captured - Toronto scenes over the past 60 years.

Harry Joy is an Honourary Life member of the PHSC. Doug Hemmy is the son of one of Harry's former neighbours who was also a competing photographer, while

Andy Brooks has been a close personal friend of Harry for the past ten years.

Ukrainians coming to Canada in the late 19th and early 20th century were thought to be from the breadbasket of Europe. And as Ukrainians, Harry's parents on immigrating to Canada were sent west to the prairies which needed farmers.

Harry was born in Winnipeg in 1917. Sometime later, his mother put the family on a train and told them they would not get off until they could see green grass at Christmas! So they moved to Toronto where Harry and his three younger brothers grew up and went to school in and around the Niagara Street area.

In his teens, Harry went to Central Tech and was fortunate enough to be in the very first class of Canada's premier art icon, Doris McArthy. From her, he learned

how to draw and about the importance of light, focus and composi-

He became a sign painter and eventually opened a silk-screen printing business producing political signs, theatrical posters, billboards, streetcar and bus signs

> and newspaper box cards.

He -oig neered a multiple-colour silkscreening technique that was a major technical advance in the industry where he was regarded as an important

supplier for over 60 years to many customers including the Toronto Daily Star and Star Weekly.

Harry also shot 16mm movies doing some work for Canada's National Film Board as well as for many private clients.

Film making is where Harry learned how to quickly anticipate peak moments of action and expression which, combined with the sense of light and composition techniques, he learned from Doris McArthy, enabled him to really capture the powerful black and white images of Toronto and its people that, as you can see in the exhibit, are most frequently described as being in the style of Henri-Cartier Bresson.

Like Bresson, and working with film in a Rollei or a Nikon F, Harry did not have today's advantage of a high fps, multiple image digital camera. Sometimes he only had one or, at the most, two or three images to work with.

One photo at the Market Gallery is of two boys playing Canada's Game. The first frame Harry took wasn't great, an intruder ruined the second frame and the shot shown there is from the third frame. Craftsmanship is evident in the composition, the juxtaposition of stick and ball and the expression on the goalkeeper's face.

A second photo, the Ice Cream Ladies is featured on the Exhibit's poster. Look at the position of the cone in the first lady's hand, and expression on the other lady's face. This was a one-frame take and won a special award for Harry.

Two other instances of immaculate timing and composition are evident by the facial expressions in the shot of the kids with the balloons and the facial expression and water drops in the shot of a girl splashing in the puddle on Augusta Avenue.

Film News: Kodak Finalizes Agreement with Major Hollywood Studios



Cinematography.com reports that Kodak has finalized film supply agreements with the major Hollywood studios. These include 20th Century Fox, Walt Disney Co., Warner Bros. Entertainment Inc. and several others. The article mentions several prominent current movies that have been shot on film, such as Boyhood, The Grand Budapest Hotel, The Imitation Game and Levathian. These agreements make it possible for Kodak to continue production of motion picture film, as well as the intermediate stock for post production and print film. A commenter on the webpage asserts that this will apply to 16mm film as well.
