So what's a Diascope?



At the Daguerreian Symposium in Kansas City, Ralph and Bobbi London of Portland, Oregon check the presentation case that Bea Cowan of Memphis, Tennessee brought for identification. It has a coloured Autochrome transparency, circa 1907, mounted in a gold metal frame so that light passes through the back of it (milk glass). The illuminated image is reflected on a mirror in the bottom of the case and is referred to as a Diascope. The portrait of an elegantly dressed lady was photographed by J.C. Strauss of St. Louis, Missouri. It would appear

that a black and white portrait was highly retouched then overpainted with colour before being copied to the Autochrome material –rather than photographing directly with the (unretouchable) transparency material itself.

I had wondered how a commercial portrait studio might put this early colour system to viable use. In the April 1908 issue of *The St. Louis and Canadian Photographer* it is reported that "some excellent samples of color photography were exhibited, the work of Mr. J. Kennedy." The Autochrome process

was later demonstrated by Toronto portrait photographer John Kennedy when the Lumière representative failed to appear at the 1908 convention of the Photographic Association of Canada.

J.C. Strauss was a leading American portraitist who set the style for others to imitate; he initiated new techniques by using cutting edge processes. It would seem he found the convenient way to present the Autochrome and satisfy the public's then rising interest in colour portraiture. — R.L.
