September 18th Meeting...

Dr. Jennifer McKendry of Kingston, Ontario will commence our Fall series of programming with a trip back in time covering the history of her home town. Her illustrated talk entitled Early Photography in Kingston: People and Places will introduce the history and architecture of Kingston and speak about the generations of photographers from the Daguerreian age to the turn of the century in 1900. Jennifer will compare old city views with views of today.

A popular speaker, Jennifer was awarded a PHSC Publication Grant 1998 for her book *Early* Photography in Kingston. She seems ever so busy having produced a portfolio of books on Canadian Art, Architecture, Folk Art, History and Photography. Currently under way is a book on the cemeteries and graveyards in Ontario involving 110,000 words and 300 illustrations. In addition she serves as editor/designer for both Foundations, the newsletter of the Frontenac Heritage Foundation as well as for News & Views, newsletter of the Society for the Study of Architecture in Canada.

Dr. McKendry's curriculum vitae is an impressive listing of accomplishments and experience as curator, consultant and guest lecturer across the country. Her awards received run consistently from 1975



through to 1999; publications and papers presented are impressive. Profile Kingston magazine recently devoted four pages to elaborate on Jennifer as an architectural historian and photographer. She will bring a selection of her published books to sell and personally autograph. 🛰

KEN POST PASSES

Internationally renowned cinematographer Ken Post of Mississauga, Ont., who was a trail blazer in the Canadian film and television industry will be remembered for feats and accomplishments with the camera. Experienced in Arctic conditions he was called upon to shoot the dangerous cliff-hanging ski chase scene that opened the 1977 James Bond movie: *The Spy Who Loved Me*. An anthropological documentary series on the Netsilik Eskimo required travelling by dog sled and living in tents and igloos.

Born in Windsor he began a newspaper career in Woodstock learning to use the Speed Graphic. After serving with the RCAF he started his own portrait studio which he ran for 11 years then joined a London television station as a newsreel stringer rising in the ranks of Canadian cinematographers. In later years his real love was imparting his cine knowledge to his students at Humber and Conestoga Colleges. He'll be missed from our ranks.



"I'm walking because others can't do it for themselves."

Our "Huck Finn" Past President Michael Oesch has kept us posted on his walk to Canada's East coast and return, raising money for the Easter Seals Campaign. From email we've followed his progress from Montreal to Quebec, then fol-



lowing route 138 along the North Shore of the St. Lawrence, Baie Comeau, Sept Isle, Port Hope Simpson, then Newfoundland, by boat to Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, PEI, then across the bridge into New Brunswick. He writes:

"I've been walking for 138 days from Toronto to Labrador and am on my return trip home —some 5000km this year. I've seen little photographica except for the 1930's Studio Hockey Portrait that I picked up in PEI and sent to our friends in the Hockey Hall of

in the Hockey Hall of Fame.

"As I was walking out of Richibucto Village a brown pick-up pulled into a house on the corner and I thought here would be a good place to camp by the river. I said hello to this guy washing his car but he just stared at me. I knew that this wasn't the right

person to ask. From behind me in the brown pick-up came a voice. 'What are you looking for?' – 'A place to pitch my tent,' I replied. 'Well hop in, I'm just back down the road in Cap Lumière.'

"Now I haven't hopped into many cars even to go back down the road but something told me that this was where I had to be. Allen, my new friend, said he didn't know why he had picked me up but today he was going to take care of me. We arrived at his wooden home overlooking the ocean and he cooked up steaks and potatoes.

"After dinner I pulled out the guitar and played some good old music and he just loved it. For the next hour Allen pounded back the beers while I played that little backpacker's guitar. Allen chipped in, 'There's a friend of mine you have to see tonight. I've had 5 beers since you started playing purple haze, You OK to drive?' I replied I had my license but I hadn't driven stick-shift in over 15 years and hadn't been behind the wheel since being designated driver in Labrador. There, I only had to worry about staying out of the snow banks. Well, it was into the pick-up, 'Allen you're on the stick, I'll do everything else.' Allen has been driving for 45 years, trucking for 25. We talked of the road, of Wawa the Hitchhiker's horror. I stopped there once while hiking out west. Luckily I matched up with a trucker who warned me to get in or be stuck there for 26 years with 3 kids and no hope of ever leaving. So I listened and hopped in. I'm getting

better at listening. Listening to the birds, trains, the hum of the wires and the sound of the breeze.

"Into Bouctouche Reserve we pulled up to a house off the main strip with a fire being prepared in the fire pit. As I got out a new voice said 'I know you!' I denied it, yet in his eyes I saw the reflected wisdom of the source. This, I realized, was my Medicine Man. I picked up his guitar, a 1989 Ibanez j300. It's almost identical to my six string back home. My mom won that guitar for me back when I was 16. I've had it through thick and thin and have owned many others. It was always my baby - I've fallen asleep with her in my arms more than any other, and when I close my eyes it's always her that cries my passion. Tonight my Medicine Man offered me the gift of music – the songs heard in the breeze. Out from my pack I pulled the Bean Pod Shaker given to me by Miracle of the Mohawks in Tyendinaga. And my Medicine Man gave me a spearhead that I must bring back to my Mohawk friend to fish the Spring Rivers.

"We sat across the table and said little words, exchanging everything through the eyes and the ears - in the music and in the song. The Shaker, brought and given to me, helped heal the demon here. My Medicine Man, in return, spoke my dreams in my eyes, and forth came the music which only weeks ago I thought unattainable. For from within comes the sound and through my fingers the fire. Around that fire the spirits danced. They begged me to stay, they offered me peace and tranquility, they offered me mother earth, orgasmic ecstasy but it was time to go. Allen had fallen asleep soon after we got there. How long had time passed? Hours? Days? Years? Or was it seconds? I could no longer tell the difference. I just knew that I had been the messenger and the student as well as the teacher. I asked my Medicine Man to come join me down the road when I make my walk into Burnt Church." ->
