Toronto Notes...

With over 60 years of professional photography under his belt, George Hunter of Mississauga has many a story to tell. He kept our January audience thoroughly entertained as he winged his way through triumphs and tribulations. His career started when he was twelve years old. In 1937, his school sent him to the Coronation of King George VI which he snapped with a Voigtländer Bessa. George is still active today using traditional films, however he confesses that he has moved to digital printing.


While visiting London, George took his first aerial shots from an autogyro through the perspex window. Ever since, his aerial shots have been taken with the aircraft door removed! An early outing almost ended his career. To the surprise of both George and pilot, he fell out the open doorway and landed on the wing-strut. Between the two of them, George was finally pulled back to safety. His experience taught him to always wear both a safety belt and a secured lanyard.

Nick Morant (CPR) and Harry Rowed (CNR) were his mentors in photography. The two were consummate practical jokers. George relates receiving a call from Malak of Ottawa who was much concerned about George's health -- turned out the two railroad photographers led Malak to believe they had beaten up George for poaching their photographic territory!

Beginning his career at Stovel Brothers in Winnipeg, George was so green he had to ask a Kodak representative to show him how to load the camera's film holder. His first shot, a coffin taken on Kodachrome, was still good fifty years later. Moving to the Winnipeg Tribune, he learned how to persevere. During the years of WW 2, he was on call seven days a week and 24 hours a day for the handsome sum of \$20.00 a week. Trying to get a night off by

evading persistent calls, George almost missed the biggest fire to ever hit Winnipeg. One of his shots that night took up the entire front page of the next day's Tribune!

After two years at the newspaper, George moved on to a five year sojourn at the National Film Board covering all aspects of Canada. At the end of a holiday in Europe, George visited the Sabena Airlines who offered a free trip to the Congo. He called his boss to get an extension to his holiday and was told to



rush back as assignments awaited. When George arrived home, he kept his bags packed ready to leave again but found the statement regarding pending assignments untrue. George quit on the spot and chose to try it on his own. Since his main interest was aerial photography, he boldly asked his bank for a \$7,000 loan to buy an airplane. He was turned down. A friend suggested trying her bank. After hearing George's story, the loan was granted and he found himself in business.

George came up with a different business approach to get customers. He took aerial shots first then introduced his services to prospective industrial/corporate customers. This brought him progress assignments and developed a customer base.

Hunter completed many assignments for Time-Life in New York, including one of his most notable. In a discussion on the impossibility of taking night time aerial shots in colour, he accepted the challenge and was given two weeks to complete what

became an eye-popping report on "USA After Dark". With such a tight schedule, he approached Kodak in Rochester to borrow an f/1 lens which he knew they were developing. Only a single sample had been manufactured and it was in (of all places) Ottawa at the National Research Centre. Through inner contacts and validation he was able to borrow the lens and mount it on a huge aerial camera.

If the weather was good there was only a ten minute window in which to get the day's shots. This was the narrow interval when dusk moved to darkness and you could see both street lights and enough surrounding detail that looked like a night shot. The colour film had to be push-processed 2 to 4 stops which looked awful but luckily could be corrected during engraving. The key to the situation was worked out by George during his own flying assignments. The pilot had to bring the plane to a dangerous stall for a brief few seconds during which

George cranked off shots at slow shutter speeds – just enough to give a working exposure. The cumbersome camera, poking out the doorway, was nestled in George's lap and cradling feet – the pilot had to position the plane in order to actually aim the camera. Most exposures were a bit fuzzy. If shot too early they looked like broad daylight, but there were enough good pictures to complete the assignment triumphantly.
