After a bit of scurrying, our not so silent auction got under way. Past President Bill Kantymir pushed for a shift to a live auction to encourage more active bidding. We are sure those who attended, agreed.

The auction built up steam over the next hour and a half as Bill Kantymir and Ed Warner worked their way through 50 - 60 lots left over from the Walter Shean Collection held earlier this year.

Ed Warner gave an enthusiastic performance in the art of auctioneering. The decision to switch from a silent auction format to a live auction elevated Ed to the role of prime auctioneer. President Mike Robinson arrived directly from the class he teaches at Ryerson Polytech University with additional lots of antiquites to add to the evening's presentation.

The bidding and banter made for a lively evening as all lots opened at one quarter of the catalogue estimated value. Some of the original mail auction lots were regrouped while at least one was split into two lots.

After the first pass through all items, the few remaining lots were

The highlight of the evening was the sale of a lot represented by name only - a huge studio wet plate camera with stand and lens. The winning bidder mentioned that he had a studio camera in his collection but no stand.

Thanks to the efforts of the auction team, the evening ended on a successful note for both the Shean estate, our society and the winning bidders.

Everyone was pleased to see long time member Fred Hunt at the meeting. Hunt broke his leg last year but complications resulted in his hospitalization. Larry Boccioletti tracked him down in a small hospital north of Toronto. Fred recently was discharged and returned home but continues therapy sessions.

## FROM THE 'NET

Biggest news to fly the internet is the announcement that the giant of the photo industry, Eastman Kodak, is to shift focus from a film based industry to concentrate on digital business. The shift to digital is progressing faster than expected resulting from film sales declining at an ever steeper rate - 12 percent a year through to 2006. The movie industry, which accounted for vast amounts of film, has swung heavily to digital video to bring costs within bounds. Kodak has cut some 30,000 jobs over the last six years and continues to outsource production of products and equipment to foreign countries where labour is cheapest.

Previously it was announced that Kodak Canada would drop all production of emulsion coated products thus ending a 100 years association with silver halide products. The Toronto production plant will henceforth concentrate on its already established digital-printing coated papers. To put a positive spin to the change Kodak says that they will be spared the time consuming task of cleaning machinery between coating changes.

Halide emulsion coating will shift to Mexico and Brazil while facilities in China will enlarge as that market increases. Rochester revealed it would start making private-label film to use up some idle capacity at its plants.

Kodak will concentrate investment in non-photographic areas making new forays into digital territory already dominated by hefty wellentrenched competitors. Hewlett-Packard and Sony have already cornered big chunks of the digital camera market. Lexmark International and Hewlett, both companies with which Kodak had unsuccessful joint ventures, continue to unveil new photo-capable printers. Kodak will continue its pursuit to purchase other companies to swing it faster into line. It predicts it will spend \$3 billion on acquisitions by the end of 2006. Kodak shares took an 18% loss when its dividend was cut by more that 2/3rds to help finance the effort.

After the recent demise of Lisle-Kelco Ltd. the future of PhotoNews,



their newsy little trade publication, looked very dim. It is now announced that Amplis Foto is to be the proud new owner and will distribute the first issue in early October. Gunter Ott continues as

editor. 

# Craig's Daguerreian Registry

Craig's Daguerreian Registry was first published in 1994 as a brief listing of the known daguerreian operators in the United States between 1839 and 1860. Since then much new information has been integrated into the biographies to create the new registry containing just under 9500 entries. The revised edition has nearly 1000 new entries with double that of revisions and changes to existing information. Dealers, artists, stereographers, females and blacks are included.

**Volume 1** is arranged alphabetically by name, providing biographical information of persons connected with the daguerreian
